- Attended undergraduate and graduate college
 - o Drake University, Des Moines, IA
- Relocation to Greenwich Village
- Married George "Jig" Cram Cook
 - o Evidence of difficult marriage
 - Miscarriage/no children

Provincetown Players

- Founded 1916
- Sustain unknown American playwrights
- Strict regulations for accepting plays

The Times

- World War I
 - Amusement and the war effort
 - o Armistice signed on November 11th, 1918
- Gender
 - Marriage was binding
 - Divorce reflected poorly on the women
 - Jobs for women were restricted
 - o 19th Amendment ratified August 18th, 1920



How Did They Act?

- "True Woman" vs "New Woman"
 - o True: domesticity, motherhood, submission, morality.
 - New: Clever, interesting, resourceful, self-determined.
 - Strong and comic

- Men spread or cross at knee




Glossary
